There's no better way to honour the pioneers of bluegrass and country music than to sing the stories they've penned, so we chose a few favourites for this CD... and we've included some originals we believe will add to the bluegrass canon. Hope you enjoy them!

We had a ton of fun putting together our versions of **Somehow Tonight**, **Hello City Limits**, **Sweet Dreams**, **Eight More Miles To Louisville** (clap along!), **Luxury Liner**, **I Hope You Have Learned**, and **Who'll Watch The Home Place**.

Pat Moore has penned songs that range from hard driving trios to soft and gentle duets. Sing along to *Lone Pine Standing* with the evocative image of a strong single pine on a mountaintop etched with lovers' initials. Be drawn in by the soft questioning of a broken heart that still hopes in *I'll Be Your Fool ('Til The End of My Days.)*

There will always be humour with Maple Hill; Pat's **Don't Trouble Trouble** reminds us of wise old sayings mothers have for their children to cheer them up when they have grabbed the apron strings and cried out with a sad tale. The words are good medicine for our own adult trials and troubles.

Pat wrote *The Shores of Black Lake* recalling her formative years near Rose's Landing, outside Perth, Ontario, a place that remains dear to her heart. The song gives voice to the universal longing to return to the locations of our youth, the places where "memory escapes time". We can almost hear the water rippling, because we've all been to this very lake.

Lay Me Down is both a personal and a universal experience, recognizing the strength of faith of those who are ready to go home to a place still unseen. Pat writes beautifully about her mom's final moments in a way we can all relate to.

In *Back To You*, Garry Greenland puts a little twist into the standard blues story, with a supposedly wronged man coming to the realization that he was actually the one who was untrue in the relationship. Have fun with the last verse and chorus.

We like Hello City Limits so much we asked Kevin Golka to write a third verse! You'll love it - we do.

So enjoy these songs, old and new, borrowed and blue, and keep Maple Hill's **Back To You** close to your CD player. Remember...it's all about the stories. Thanks! ...your friends in Maple Hill
